BETTINA HOY'S spectacular pillar-to-post victory with Seigneur Medicott in the Rookery Park Stud CIC2* was overshadowed by New Zealand rising star Tom Gadsby's fatal accident later in the day (see news.p4).

This led to the abandonment of the CIC* just a handful of horses into the 130-strong class. It cast a huge shadow over the popular Cheshire event as the news filtered back to the lorry park.

"Much as I was excited by 'Micky's' win, Tom's tragic accident puts it into perspective and my heart goes out to his family and friends," said Bettina.
